


#### **Scripture Summary**

The sign up sheets for the fall are now posted outside of the sanctuary! We are looking for coffee time volunteers, scripture readers, and greeters.



First meeting October 27th
'The Other Side of the River:
from Church Pew to Sweat Lodge'



The Men's Study Group will begin to look at a new book, meeting over Zoom later this month, Mondays at 10:00 am. Our first gathering will be October 27. It

has been 10 years since Canada's Truth and Reconciliation pathway began. I suggest we look at The Other Side of the River, from Church Pew to Sweat Lodge, by Alf Dumont.

Alf served as a United Church minister for over 40 years. This book traces Alf's path as the son of a French Canadian-Irish father and an Indigenous mother from life in Parry Sound, on to Laurentian University, Sudbury, to Emmanuel College, Toronto and eventually to walk with the church bringing the indigenous voice forward. Alf Dumont walks between the two worlds of Indigenous and settler, traditional spirituality and Christianity. He shares stories of building bridges between these worlds. Dumont challenges the church to reexamine the theology behind its past decision around residential schools, so that it might live out the words of its apologies. He challenges the country to reexamine its responsibilities and relationships with Indigenous people. Through stories, humour, poetry, and shared insights we gain some access to Alf's journey, his unique spiritual views and a partial summary of the work of the United Church of Canada from the 1980s to 2020.



## Preparing a Place of Healing

United Church ministers serving in northern communities will soon gather at Sandy-Saulteaux Spiritual Centre in Manitoba for a time of healing and renewal.

The Northern Indigenous Ministers retreat comes at a critical moment. These ministers carry extraordinary burdens: walking alongside communities devastated by loss, often among young people; leading funeral after funeral; and tending to the deep wounds of grief. This year's wildfires brought further hardship, forcing the retreat to be postponed until October. The need for rest and renewal has only grown.

Because of your incredible generosity through Mission and Service, the retreat will soon take place. Plans are in place for sharing circles where ministers can express what they've been carrying, gather for meals that nourish body and spirit, and engage in cultural practices like ribbon skirt making and beading that bring connection and joy. Massages and other healing activities will help restore strength and release long-held tension. Most importantly, ministers will be surrounded by peers, who understand the unique weight they bear and who can hold that burden alongside them.

The outpouring of support from across the church has been remarkable. Your generosity is creating a space where ministers, who are so often the ones offering care, can finally receive it themselves.

Our ministers will soon step away from the constant demands of ministry and into a circle of care, healing, and renewal. And when they return to their communities, they will carry back not only renewed strength but also the reminder that they are not alone.

Your compassion through <u>Mission and Service</u> makes this gathering possible. Thank you.


