Exploring Amalgamation Team (EAT) Update

Thank you for your attendance and participation in our after worship session last Sunday concerning our work on exploring amalgamation with St. John's UC. Our main objective was to give you an opportunity to share your thoughts and feelings in this process. We are so pleased with your thoughtful questions and your willingness to share your hopes and thoughts. We will take away this valuable input to share in our continuing discussions with the larger EAT group.

While you continue to ponder and reflect on what you've heard so far, please keep these key points in mind:

- This process does take time to do it well. We want to be sure that we gather all of the necessary information so that each person is well prepared when they vote on whether or not to amalgamate with St. John's.
- Our EAT members have had many discussions concerning the vision of a brand new church entity. While we would want to hold some of our key values in place from both congregations, we will need to be open to envisioning a new church and way of being should the vote be in favour of amalgamation. Some important considerations would include music, outreach, inclusive and meaningful worship - using these to attract young people and families to grow our congregation.
- There will be much work and many decisions to be made should we vote to amalgamate. This will include determining the vision, our properties, staffing and numerous other details, all of which will take more involvement from our members and will take time.
- We will continue to keep you updated leading up to the Annual General Meeting (AGM)
- Please reach out to one of our members of EAT: Colleen Armstrong, Brian Heinmiller, Joanne Wardle, and Mark Wyatt any time you need further clarification or have additional questions. We will do our best to listen and address these.

Men's Online Bible Study

First meeting October 27th
'The Other Side of the River:
from Church Pew to Sweat Lodge'



The Men's Study Group will begin to look at a new book, meeting over Zoom later this month, Mondays at 10:00 am. Our first gathering will be October 27. It

has been 10 years since Canada's Truth and Reconciliation pathway began. I suggest we look at The Other Side of the River, from Church Pew to Sweat Lodge, by Alf Dumont.

Alf served as a United Church minister for over 40 years. This book traces Alf's path as the son of a French Canadian-Irish father and an Indigenous mother from life in Parry Sound, on to Laurentian University, Sudbury, to Emmanuel College, Toronto and eventually to walk with the church bringing the indigenous voice forward. Alf Dumont walks between the two worlds of Indigenous and settler, traditional spirituality and Christianity. He shares stories of building bridges between these worlds. Dumont challenges the church to reexamine the theology behind its past decision around residential schools, so that it might live out the words of its apologies. He challenges the country to reexamine its responsibilities and relationships with Indigenous people. Through stories, humour, poetry, and shared insights we gain some access to Alf's journey, his unique spiritual views and a partial summary of the work of the United Church of Canada from the 1980s to 2020.

Please do not cut any squares, as we'll be cutting them to a uniform size for the sale.



The 40 Days of Engagement on Anti-Racism are underway, and now is the best time to join in. Wherever you are on the journey, today is the right day to take the next step. Across Canada and beyond, people are gathering in faith and courage to confront racism, to listen deeply, and to act for justice. This is not a quick or easy process. The conversations can be uncomfortable. They reveal where racism lives—in systems, in communities, and within ourselves—and they push us to ask: What does justice look like in real life? Every day in this program offers tools to walk this path: prayers that ground us, reflections that shift perspectives, stories and videos that bring lived experiences into focus, and action steps that help turn awareness into change. These resources are created by ministers, lay leaders, educators, and community members—people who bring lived experience, wisdom, and hope. This work is not just about understanding racism. It's about dismantling it. From October 14 to November 28, 2025, the 40 Days include:

- Live online events with dynamic speakers every Wednesday at 6:00 p.m.
 ET
- Weekly short videos with accompanying reflections and action items
- Downloadable resources designed for both groups and individuals

The learning doesn't stop there. All resources remain available online so that individuals, congregations, and community groups can keep learning, keep talking, and keep acting. Anti-racism is a lifelong journey.


